# Care Possible: The Digital Platform Revolutionizing Home Care Access in Manitoba

#### We heard from many Manitobans who struggle to connect with the right care provider.

We developed Care Possible to help mitigate those issues of safety and security, and bring about change in our community.

The digital platform is breaking new ground by changing the way Manitobans access home care. Care Possible's filters and matching algorithms lead to better search results, helping connect clients with the perfect service providers to meet their needs and care requirements.

Care Possible has proven to be vital and timely, on-boarding over 1,500 users and providing over 1,000 hours of care since launching in November 2022.

# Cultural Brokers Network of Canada

#### 100 Years with Easter Seals

Manitoba Possible marked Easter Seals' centennial anniversary by illuminating notable landmarks across the province with Easter Seals' trademark red. Additionally, we showed solidarity for accessibility and inclusion awareness on Red Shirt Day. The **Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba** also hosted a reception, extending invitations to past Manitoba Possible ambassadors, dedicated volunteers, program participants, and donors. The commemorative event was a testament to the profound impact Easter Seals has had on Manitoba.

## Cultural Brokers Network of Canada

Cultural brokers increase the overall well-being of individuals and families by providing culturally sensitive support to help navigate various agencies and programs. This year, we started working with organizations across Canada (Laurentian University, Multicultural Health Brokers Co-Op and Umbrella Multicultural Health) on a three-year project to uncover a collective identity of core values and principles of cultural brokers in Canada.



# We continue to expand and broaden our programs to meet the diverse needs of our community.

**Financial Empowerment participants received over \$495,000 in tax refunds** in 2022 through our free income tax filing services for people with disabilities living on low income.

Children's Service Coordinators launched the "My Favourite Words" initiative across rural Manitoba. This strength-based approach focuses on key areas of child development and aims to shift perspective on childhood disability. The practice is already implemented by Manitoba Possible in Winnipeg alongside our Specialized Services for Children and Youth (SSCY) partners.

Vocational Rehabilitation helped 92 Manitobans prepare for, attain, and maintain gainful employment through our education and training programs.

Children's Service Coordination and Provincial Outreach Therapy for Children received an additional \$589,000 from the Province and Manitoba's Department of Families to help reduce wait times. Families can access these crucial services sooner, which can have a significant impact on children's development and overall well-being.



American Sign Language Supports Settlement in Canada

The morning after a Winnipeg Jets playoff loss, the city is draped in disappointment. Amidst the collective frustration, a small group of Deaf newcomers take the opportunity to immerse themselves in Canadian culture.

As they break from their American Sign Language (ASL) and English lesson to grab a coffee, a student asks, "What is a Whiteout?"

One of the classes' teachers, Bob, dives into a story of how the now-legendary Winnipeg ritual of wearing all-white started 36 years ago.

"It's beneficial to talk about what's happening in our community, like with the Jets or the upcoming election. We can explain culturally specific things that are relevant to their lives," he says.

"It's a very safe place to get together," adds his colleague, Judith, who also teaches the class.

The focus is language, but Manitoba Possible's ASL for Newcomers class also serves as a bridge for immigrants and refugees to Canadian values.

"When I came, I had to learn so much. It was very overwhelming and a little bit disorienting," says Yousef, who arrived in Canada from Syria alongside his older brother Anas in 2016.

After break, the group spills out into every corner of the small classroom. Judith works with students on an English assignment. In the far corner, Bob's imaginative storytelling captivates Yousef as he shares a vivid account of a terrifying tiger encounter.

"Bob is the king of making people feel comfortable," says Judith.

Both Bob and Judith have taught English and ASL with Manitoba Possible for close to 35 years, beginning their careers in the pre-school program and reuniting in the ASL for Newcomers class five years ago. Their friendship and experience have them working as a seamless team, understanding students' needs and goals and meeting them where they're at. For many, entering the class as adults is their first opportunity to access education and learn an official language.

"School in the Philippines, I didn't have access to it. I wasn't learning until I was 24," says April Joy, who immigrated from the Philippines three years ago.

The program—funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada—empowers newcomers to pursue education and employment opportunities.

"The other day Yousef stood up and he started explaining a complex scenario in the most beautiful ASL," explains Judith. "Developing not only one but two languages as an adult, when, all your life, you've only used gestures is a slow process. When you see such incredible progress, it brings tears to your eyes."

Supporting settlement is crucial in welcoming newcomers, and building a stronger more inclusive society.

"We want them to know how to go out in the world," adds Bob. "We want to create successful life for them and language is the key to success."

# A Safe Space To Explore

#### A New Fence Becomes a Gateway to Summer Fun

Six-year old Marshall is making big plans for his backyard this summer - endless somersaults on the trampoline, splashing in a pool on hot days, and being able to camp for the first time with his family.

Three years ago, Marshall had a brain aneurysm. While he was recovering, additional concerns regarding his development were noted, and he was diagnosed with Global Developmental Delay with Autistic Features. Marshall loves playing outdoors, exploring and being chased, but his sense of adventure could cause him to flee at any moment. A new fence has opened a world of possibility for the family, creating a safe, relaxing space where they can experience those summer plans.

"We now have a space to ground ourselves and say 'look at all the hard things we went through, now it's time to enjoy'," says Marshall's mom, Cheryl.

"Marshall and his brother can now be outside together and have that bonding time. That simple piece, which is just a fence for some, is a whole other area of space for us to be connected with nature."




Through a family-centred approach focused on strengths, needs and goals, Marshall's Manitoba Possible children's service coordinator worked with the family on navigating programs available in their small Manitoba community.

Giving Marshall the opportunity to run and play by securing Easter Seals funding for a fence is one of the many ways Manitoba Possible supports his family.

"They've been a really good cheerleader for us, providing me with things I never ever would think to ask for," says Cheryl. "As a parent, when something like this happens to your child, you don't even know what to ask for."

Manitoba Possible's supports families in breaking down barriers for children with disabilities. For Marshall and his family, a fence has provided a safe space where they can enjoy summer without worry.



A manda first learned about Manitoba Possible when she was fighting to get her life back. She was living in an unsafe home and had a life-changing injury.

The former restaurant manager had sustained a serious injury that made her unable to work in hospitality. Tracey, Amanda's Manitoba Possible vocational rehabilitation counsellor, helped her enroll in Manitoba Possible's Vocational Rehabilitation program and Employment Preparation Centre.

# "It wasn't until I walked in that I discovered just how much opportunity there was," Amanda says.

The Vocational Rehabilitation program assists adults with disabilities to plan, attain, and maintain gainful employment. The Employment Preparation Centre provides assessment services and employment support, like resume development, interview preparation and onthe-job training. Both programs are funded by the Manitoba Government.

As Amanda got started on attaining employment, she became unhoused and unable to find affordable and accessible housing. It took years for Amanda to find a safe space to be ready to go back to school and find employment.

Amanda landed a job as an assistant manager at Don's Photo. She wanted to ensure she could do a full day of work before pursuing her desired career in social media.

"[Don's Photo] was 100% willing to work with my disability. They understood my limitations and were fabulous about it. Even so, the first nine months were really difficult. I had hoped that I could go back to work, and everything would be okay. I'm not very good at recognizing my own limitations. And if it hadn't been for the staff there, I would have hurt myself again. But everyone helped. I gained the realization that all I had to do was disclose my disability and people would actually help me," she says.

The team at the Employment Preparation Centre helped Amanda craft how she could disclose her symptoms in a way that made her feel confident. Even though it was hard, it was worth it.

"You should always disclose because if the position and the people that you're working with are worth it, they will support you and will always be there to help you or back you up."

Besides disclosing a disability, Amanda has one more piece of advice aimed at Manitobans who want to be more inclusive and accessible: "Never assume. You can't see my disability. Don't ever make assumptions about a person's ability."

Easter Seals Nova Scotia first hosted the event in Halifax in 2005, and it has since been adopted by provincial organizations across Canada.


# CENTURY 21. Curling for a Cause Westman Realty Ltd.




The dedicated team at Century 21 Westman Realty raised an impressive \$11,000 at this winter's Easter Seals Bonspiel.
